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

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

Why Do We Even Need A Lobbyist?

One of the questions I get asked most often is "Why do we even need a lobbyist?" It's a good question. One answer was offered by the New York lawyer and judge Gideon Tucker way back in the late 1800's. Judge Tucker, in a surrogate court decision, wrote "No man's life, liberty, or property are safe while the legislature is in session."

And so it is today.

In any given two-year session of the New York State Legislature, more than 10,000 individual bills are introduced by the 213 legislators that make up the State Senate and Assembly. That's a staggering number – and if you think many of these are well thought out, free of populist politics, or well researched – think again. And while

many of these don't have anything to do with the electronic security industry, a surprising number often do.



When I first started working with NYESLA – back then it was the NY Burglar and Fire Alarm Association – there was a bill that declared exculpatory clauses in alarm contracts unenforceable by an alarm company. Customers could bring lawsuits against alarm companies for the full and total value of any loss from a burglary or fire by claiming the alarm didn't work, was installed incorrectly, or whatever suited their claim. Alarm companies could be held liable for losses of which they were unaware or could not know. This would have been catastrophic for the security industry--and if the association hadn't had a lobbyist and lobbied against it, it may have become law.

More recently, legislation was introduced and passed by the Senate and Assembly known as the "Digital Repair Act." While ostensibly a "consumer rights" bill, it would have required manufacturers of electronic equipment, including security equipment, to provide anyone that asked—ANYONE -- the documents needed to repair the product, including passcodes and schematics. Criminals could have learned how to disable even some of the most sophisticated alarms. This would have been disastrous for the electronic alarm industry and for the customers of alarm systems.

We arranged for NYESLA's President to meet with legislators, legislative staff, and the Governor's office and educate them on why not exempting security systems was such a bad idea—and they listened and in the final bill, which became law, exempted security systems from the law.

Just one bad bill could be disastrous for the alarm industry. These are just two examples of why it's important for associations like NYESLA to be engaged and actively involved in the legislative process. Already this year we've identified almost 40 bills that directly impact the electronic security industry--from limiting the technology used for access control, increasing liability for breaches of data privacy, expanding the kind of protected data, or banning most biometric and facial recognition technology used in smart systems.

Much of what lobbyists do is play defense, but we also help NYESLA play a proactive role in the legislative process. Working with NYESLA we helped write and support legislation that would limit local governments from fining alarm companies for false alarms. Local governments around the nation, and some in New York, are considering, or have passed, local laws that fine alarm companies for every false alarm—regardless of whether the alarm was the company's fault. The bill passed the State Assembly last year and we are busy working to get it to the Governor's desk this year.

In a way, having a lobbyist is like having insurance for your business. Lobbyists bring expertise in navigating the political process, have access to policymakers, and can effectively communicate your needs and concerns to decision-makers. Our connections and understanding of the legislative process can make your voice heard in ways that might be difficult to achieve on your own. We have the tools, resources and experience to keep you safe while the Legislature is in session.

IMPORTANT UPDATE FROM FinCEN

FinCEN Removes Beneficial Ownership Reporting Requirements for U.S. Companies and U.S. Persons, Sets New Deadlines for Foreign Companies

WASHINGTON—Consistent with the U.S. Department of the Treasury's March 2, 2025 announcement, the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN) is issuing an interim final rule that removes the requirement for U.S. companies and U.S. persons to report beneficial ownership information (BOI) to FinCEN under the Corporate Transparency Act.

In that interim final rule, FinCEN revises the definition of "reporting company" in its implementing regulations to mean only those entities that are formed under the law of a foreign country and that have registered to do business in any U.S. State or Tribal jurisdiction by the filing of a document with a secretary of state or similar office (formerly known as "foreign reporting companies"). FinCEN also exempts entities previously known as "domestic reporting companies" from BOI reporting requirements.

Thus, through this interim final rule, all entities created in the United States — including those previously known as "domestic reporting companies" — and their beneficial owners will be exempt from the requirement to report BOI to FinCEN. Foreign entities that meet the new definition of a "reporting company" and do not qualify for an exemption from the reporting requirements must report their BOI to FinCEN under new deadlines, detailed below. These foreign entities, however, will not be required to report any U.S. persons as beneficial owners, and U.S. persons will not be required to report BOI with respect to any such entity for which they are a beneficial owner.

Understanding the NYS Security / Fire Alarm Installer License Requirements:

Need for license: An individual, firm, company partnership or corporation must be licensed if it installs, maintains or services alarm systems, including, but not limited to, such items as detectors, control devices and alarm com-munication systems, conduits and associated wires of alarm systems; or if it holds itself out to the public as being able to do so. This shall include, but not be limited to, selling alarm systems to consumers when the installation, maintenance or servicing of the alarm system will be subcontracted to or otherwise performed by another;

A security and fire alarm installers license is required for the installation, maintenance or servicing of a closed circuit television system (CCTV), or video surveillance system, if such system is used, either full-time or part-time, for the detection or monitoring of intrusion, break-in, theft, movement, sound or fire; and electrical entry systems which detect and/or provide notification of intrusion, break-in, theft, movement, sound or fire regardless of the number of entry points.
